☀ CCIS VISITING RESEARCH FELLOWSHIPS

- Predoctoral and postdoctoral level
- Predoctoral applicants are expected to finish writing their dissertations during their fellowship tenure.
- Visiting Research Fellows are provided with shared office space and a computer, as well as full access to all UC San Diego academic, institutional, and recreational resources.
- For the current academic year, stipends are \$2,250 per month for predoctoral fellows.
- Fellows will also receive full UCSD employee benefits. CCIS fellowships may be supplemented with compensation from other fellowships, research grants, sabbatical leaves, or other sources. Some CCIS fellows may be asked to teach a one-quarter (10-week) course in a UCSD department.
- All application materials must be submitted no later than January 15, 2005 for fellowships to be held during the 2005-06 academic year.

☀ 2004-2005 IICAS GRADUATE STUDENT TRAVEL GRANTS

- The Institute for International, Comparative, and Area Studies (IICAS) announces a competition for travel grants to support graduate student research in international, comparative, and area studies. The travel grants will be awarded for two purposes: dissertation research and conference travel for the purposes of presenting a paper. Dissertation research will be given priority in the awards.
- Awards will be made for travel between December 2004 and June 2005. Awards will not exceed \$2,000. The awards may be used to cover expenses for travel in the U.S. or abroad.

☀ THE CALIFORNIA PROGRAM ON ACCESS TO CARE (CPAC)

- Under the auspices of the California Policy Research Center of the University of California, the **California Program on Access to Care** has issued its annual Request for Proposals (RFP) for FY 2004-2005 to support applied policy research projects, dissertation projects and concept papers on topics related to health care access for California's low-income populations. The RFP and application forms are available on the CPAC web-site at <http://www.ucop.edu/cprc/rfps.html> or by phone or email to the CPAC offices. Copies of the RFP and application forms are being sent to researchers, university departments, non-profit research organizations, and campus contracts and grants offices.
- It is anticipated that a minimum of \$350,000 in University funds will be available for this regular grants competition. Generally, projects should be conducted within a six-month time period. CPAC will primarily support work that applies research expertise to specific California policy issues related to health care access rather than major new empirical projects. Applicants may propose to conduct secondary data analysis or seek supplemental funding for on-going projects.
- The deadline for receipt of Letters of Intent is Friday, October 22, 2004. No full proposal will be accepted without the submission and approval of a Letter of Intent. Letters of

Intent must be submitted in the format specified in the guidelines. The Letters will be reviewed to identify projects having the greatest potential for fulfilling CPAC,s objectives. Approved applicants will then be requested to prepare and submit a full grant proposal for submission by December 13, 2004. Notification of a request for a full proposal is expected no earlier than November 5, 2004. Awards will be announced in mid-February.

HUNTINGTON LIBRARY FELLOWSHIPS

- PURPOSE: The Huntington will award to scholars over one hundred fellowships for the academic year 2006-2007. These fellowships derive from a variety of funding sources and have different terms.

Institute/NEH Postdoctoral Fellowship
