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## **Ethnic Studies Department Chair Welcome Letter 2020-21**



Yil tol wi hokišak kuš (Good day relatives),

I greet you in the Ishak language of my ancestors. Wi hokišak kuš means we are all relatives/connected. I share this greeting to offer my hope and wish that we in the Ethnic Studies department are building relationships and bonds that go beyond the formal relationships often found in a university context. Over the past seven months we have witnessed many reminders about the importance of Critical Ethnic Studies as a vehicle for engaging, understanding, and addressing inequality in contemporary society. We recognize that there are many uncertain, painful, and stressful pressures on all of us as the United States and the world witness devastation as a result of climate neglect, anti-Black racism, religious and nationalist forms of xenophobia, gendered and sexual violence, continued land dispossession of Indigenous peoples and a global health crisis in the form of coronavirus (COVID-19).

Let us not forget that all of the recent events (fires here in California, hurricanes in the Gulf Coast of the southern United States, mass uprisings in response to police and state violence, repression of voting rights) are not new social or political phenomena. These events are

connected to centuries of colonial violence over land and over people. In Ethnic Studies it is our mission to work to address these issues in ways that will improve the world and make it more just for future generations. We can only achieve this when we come together, strengthen our connections, and support one another as kin, and as family. This year while different from any we have experienced in history; also offers us an opportunity to find ways to thrive through collective action and community building.

As the new department chair of Ethnic Studies, I want to share that I am always here to support you whether you are alumni, students, faculty, staff, administrators or other community members in the department, across campus, in San Diego or wherever your travels may take you in the world. As we begin another academic year, I want to welcome our new faculty members, Dr. Holly Okonkwo (https://ethnicstudies.ucsd.edu/people/Okonkwo.html) and Dr. Kianna Middleton (https://ethnicstudies.ucsd.edu/people/middleton.html) who represent the best of what we strive for in Ethnic Studies as a field centered in transformative justice. Please join me in welcoming them both to the department and to UCSD. While she started earlier this year, I would also like to welcome Cecilia Ozkan our Chief Administrative Officer in Ethnic Studies, Critical Gender Studies, the International Institute, and the Black Studies Project. Ceci has been instrumental in her leadership and support of the department and our sister programs during an important moment of growth and transition.

The 2020-21 academic year brings many new opportunities to build and grow as a community. 2020 marks the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of the department and celebration activities are underway, please keep an eye out for announcements. This year also marks the beginning of a new Native American and Indigenous Studies minor, the first in the history of UC San Diego. As a part of the program we are currently working with the Intertribal Resource Center on identifying an Elder/Culture Bearer in Residence. Plans for an Ethnic Studies Pre-Med major continue this year and we are excited to announce new collaborations in curriculum, mentorship, and education initiatives between our Department and the School of Medicine to address issues of racism and public health disparities. Conversations are also in process to create a Certificate in Ethnic Studies to support the growing number of UCSD students, community members, organizations, teachers, high school students, and non-profits around the country looking to expand their knowledge of Critical Ethnic Studies and apply it to their lives and careers. Our undergraduate adviser is working to help us create dual degree double major pathway information sheets to help students interested in double majoring in Ethnic Studies and other disciplines across campus. We have made new changes to our website and are expanding our social media platforms on facebook (https://www.facebook.com/ethnicstudiesucsd) and Instagram (https://www.instagram.com/ucsdethnicstudies/), please add them and share with others in our communities. In addition to these exciting new developments, the proposal to establish a Ph.D. in Ethnic Studies and in Visual Arts with a specialization in Interdisciplinary Environmental Research was approved by the UCSD Graduate Council in June 2020 and is expected to achieve final approval in October. 2020 also brings five new graduate students to our Ethnic Studies kinship circle: Cecilia Frescas-Ortiz, Andrea Gaspar, Cheron Laughing, Gustav Meuschke, and Sierra Sims. Please join me in congratulating our community on these wonderful accomplishments.
